God's Calling in the New Testament

- Lesson Six -In the Gospels – The Apostle Matthew

I. **Overview**.

he previous lessons have shown us the calling of the first apostles - Peter and John Peter and John were seekers of God In this lesson we will consider the calling of another apostle, Matthew. As we will see, Matthew was not a seeker, but rather he was a person who was a sinner and a lover of money.



Matthew was a Jew, but he worked for the Romans as a tax collector.

Matthew, or Levi as he is some-

times called, was a tax collector. He was a person who collected taxes from his own people and paid them to the Roman government. Since the Jews did not like the Roman occupation, they also did not like the tax collectors. Additionally, most of the tax collectors were known to be corrupt and kept part of the money for themselves. This is the kind of person that Matthew was. But that did not stop the Lord from calling him. No matter what kind of person we are, the Lord can still call us and we can be changed in our heart.

When the Lord Jesus called His disciples, it was not based on how good they were. Some indeed were good, but others were not so good. The Lord called those whom His Father had chosen for His kingdom.

The Calling of Matthew

One of those called by the Lord Jesus was a tax collector named

Matthew invited others to join him to feast with the Lord Jesus.

Matthew. He was also called Levi. Tax collectors were despised by the Jews for two reasons. Firstly, they were considered as traitors to their countrymen because they collected the tax money for the Roman Empire. Secondly, they often overcharged the Jewish people and kept the extra money for themselves.

The Lord purposely went to the place where Matthew worked to find him. Although Matthew was a tax collector, he was chosen by the Father to be in His heavenly kingdom. The Lord looked at Matthew as he sat at the tax office and called him saying "follow Me." In an instant a great miracle happened. Matthew, a slave of money and sin, was set free. As he looked back into the eyes of the Lord Jesus, he was released from the love of money and everything else.

Feasting with Joy in the Lord

Matthew was filled with great joy and thanks. He prepared a great feast for the Lord Jesus and invited many of his friends to join them. As they ate together in Matthew's house, others came to blame the Lord for eating with tax collectors and sinners. Jesus answered that He was not sent to call the righteous, but sinners.



Matthew loved the Lord Jesus and was very thankful that the Lord had come to call him to salvation. Matthew faithfully followed the Lord Jesus and was even chosen by the Lord to become one of His twelve apostles. Later, Matthew wrote concerning his experience of the Lord. His writing became part of the New Testament, the first book, the Gospel of Matthew.

It is important for us to understand that the Lord's calling is not based on how good we are. He calls those whom the Father has chosen. How we thank Him that He has called us.
